I must admit to certain apprehension before seeing THE JAM for the first time. Sixties revivalists second hand Who? I was'nt sure whether it would be for me, but it was. You can have a great time at a Jam bang.

But my apprehension started with the venue, the only other band i'd seen there was Generation X, and on that particular night the punters could've crowded in the dressing room to hear the band ... It was that packed.

However, the surprises started on arrival, there was loads of people there. Although it seemed to me that most of the locals had turned up to see the support band. Adrumme r with dreadlocks, a Shaft lookalike on bass, and a lead singer with a headband. fuckin 'ell, talk about boredom.

About midnight the stage was set for the Jam, as much space as possible was made, and there was a giant unionjack as a backdrop. this was to match up with the Jam's "I'm Backing Britain" type lapel badges.

IMAGE?, well yeh, you gotta talk about it have 'nt you. Real mod gear, square lensed polaroids, black suits featuring double breasted highway man type jackets, tight strides with an almost unnoticable flair, pink socks, black chisel toed shoes

with white uppers, white buttoned



down, fly away collared shirts, everything was like they say it used to be.

On drums is RICK BUCKLER, coming over as the archtypal quiet man of the band, black drums and real acne What a great drummer!!

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BRUCE FOXTON plays bass and sings some vocals. He hops about the stage like a rabbit with a brainstorm, he shakes his head like he wants to get rid of it. What a great bassist!! On guitar and vocals is PAUL

WELLER, Christ does he look the part. Exactly the same type Rickenbacker guitar that Pete Townsend used, and the same actions as well. Y'know, bouncing up and down higher and higher on the spot. Then on the last bounce when he's reached his highest point, his feet, heels together go up behind him, and with his guitar on his right hip, he looks over his left shoulder at his heels ... FABULOUS!!

Jam originals are good, not much differant structurally to most new wave bands material. Short, crisp and exciting. "In the City", their first single out now on Polydor is very good, they did it twice, once as an encore. Other good originals were "Bricks and Mortar", "My Address", and a thing called "Carnaby Street", all about a famous London tourist attracti apparently. Some hippy from the back shouts 'Second hand mods', Paul Weller quick as a flash, 'I don't remember 'em mate, Do you?'

There were genuine tributes to their heros throughout, particularly a great version of "Rollercoaster".

But the highpoint for me was near the end when Paul announced some rhythm and blues. "Midnight Hour", Jee: it was great, pounding along, it seemed to be written for a band just like the Jam, as the time had now pushed on to about quater to one, this song was real appropriate. Best of all was the bass break, during this number Paul and Rick stop playing and Bruce chuggs away at that bass riff, it sent a shiver up my back, round my neck, and back down again.

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LETTER TO LOADED

I just read LOADED. I loved and hated it. The reviews were excellant. I don't share your appreciation for THE DAMNED though. Punk rock will stand or fall on the energy(constructive or destructive/ musical or political) that it creates. Fashion is just the fringe and when the safety pins and stuff become passe a lot of crap is going to be soaked down the drains. (The Damned included.)

Further thoughts on the movement.

THE CLASH and THE STRANGLERS are the only decent U.K. bands that i've heard. (Have you seen the collage fanzine "Londons Burning" its amazing) I really relate to the Clash's philosophy. As they said in NME last week they are the total antithesis of the Blank Generation. They'll survive. You may have guessed that i don't like the more negative aspects of the movement. Anyone can stand on stage and gob at the audiance. Christs the bosses gob on us all day, alleweek, 52 weeks a year. I want abreak from all that.And anyway THE RAMONES have got being Blank down to a fine art. (Better than all those bands who really have to try so hard to look dumb.) Most of the good new wave stuff has come from the States. (They've got better roots i.e. VELVET UNDERGROUND, STOOGES, DOORS) TELEVISION are incredible, when TOM VERLAINE sings "I understand all destructive urges", it sends a shiver down my spine. TOM PETTY and the HEARTBREAKERS are o.k., and PATTI SMITH embodies perfectly the energy of the new wave. Then theres IGGY of course, The Idiot is probably the best album of the year. Also worth checking out are the "Live at Max's album" and the CEGB's album.

As i said before i don't like much of the English stuff but its early days yet. The SEX PISTOLS are puppets, overrated puppets at that, and Malcolm McLaren is pulling the strings. (He knows as much about anarchy as Margaret Thatcher knows about getting high)He just wants to sell his fucking clothes. ULTRUVOX are a bunch of poseurs, all trying there best to look wasted and underfed, and besides, Bob Harris likes them so there must be something wrong there. I have'nt checked out THE CORTINAS yet but they sound promising.
